


A Coast to Coast walk (well, most of it!)

I completed the Lake District portion of Wainwrights Coast to Coast walk in 2015. Ten years go by and I realise if I am to complete the journey I had better get on with it. So this book is about both journeys. My friend Glyn Carter came with me for the first journey and five days of the second. He would walk a couple of miles and return to the car, picking me up at the end of the day. This allowed us to stay in a central Airbnb while he was with me.

Wainwrights' total journey is 190 miles. With my transport arrangements I missed out 15% because some bits were boring, brewing storms required a shortened day or if I wanted to keep within my 12 mile walking limit.am I worried about this failure of completeness?... nope, I think my life time walking credentials are good enough.

I have put an overall map at the beginning of each years journey, and the detailed maps for each day at the end of the book. Otherwise it's a picture book that gives you a visual peep into an unfolding journey with little text.






I saw this pattern frequently, taken from the wall of a house that had a lot of layers of paint on it.

Out of the mist the Nine Standards apear.











On the fourth morning it made sense to walk from our Airbnb accommodation at Twaite (above), rather than back track to Keld. Below the village of Muker



































The birds are, Red Grouse aparently. One tried to make me his / her pall. It took me some time to get it to fly.
















The last days walking was a complete mishmash. It took me through a wood, a heritage railway and a moor destroyed by fire














Throughout the 2025 trip I had a fun time generating the cartoon on the right, using Chat GPT.


I was totally fascinated in how it would promise me things it could not do.


On the other hand did we visualise AI when I started this journey in 2015?







Daily Maps from 2015
