

After spending the night with Kathryn and Jon we had an exciting time getting to Madrid from London City airport. A mixture of tube strike, taxi dash then delayed flight due to mist at the airport we eventually collected our hire car (an underpowered 1.2ltr Corsa) at 3.30pm.

We then had a reasonably pleasant drive to Cuidad Real, which was always planned as just a stop off point between Madrid and Cordoba.

Because the hotel was in a pedestrian area our GPS refused to take us there. Eventually we found our way to its hidden access; behind a garage door and to the lift that took us down to the bijou car park. It was the cheapest hotel of our stay (due to being a non-tourist town).... It was also very good, a great room with view overlooking the pedestrian streets.

We ate in the town square at a place recommended by the hotel. The view was good, wine great, but the food questionable.....a series of dips.

The next morning we had a quick look round the town centre and after knocking off the cathedral we decided we had seen all there was to see.

Finding the hotel was once again exciting, as it was in the middle of a restricted area with a big festival taking place. We cracked the problem by paying a taxi driver to lead the way. Dumping our bags we grabbed an indifferent tapas lunch before going straight into a walking trip around the town via the Jewish quarter before collapsing in a cafe for water near the riding school. Onwards then to the river and bridge before calling time out for a well deserved beer by the river.

We booked a pleasant looking restaurant for the next night evening meal and ate at another tapas place which was good and went to bed having achieved the plan.

The next day we were up early for a free visit to the Mezquita, then back to the hotel for breakfast. Afterwards we walked to a large square used by the Romans as a circus etc.... more coffee. We then strolled on to a small local art gallery.

Exhausted by our efforts we had a beer, before moving seamlessly on to lunch of tortilla and chopped tomatoes. Suitably refreshed we walked the back streets to visit the Alcazar and gardens. Again we stopped near the riding school for water and shade.

After a break at the hotel to 'prepare my body' we went out for a drink followed by a tour of a local church which was preparing for a wedding we sat outside and watched. The evening meal was great and not too expensive, taken at a small restaurant with tables outside in the pedestrian area. I tried a sangria or two, wine would have been a better choice. The meal finished with complimentary desert wine. We later discovered that this restaurant was number 1 out of 435 in Cordoba according to Trip Advisor.




















































































































































Granada and The Alhambra Palace

We drove to Granada through olive groves and via Priego de Cordoba, with views over the local hills. At 4pm we arrived at our hotel which was beautifully situated on a hillside, looking one way to the snow topped mountains of the Sierra Nevada and the other over the city of Granada. After dumping our cases we walked down into Granada at just the right time: the festival procession was about to beginparading horses, carts and waggons. After some tapas and beer we visited the cathedral then on to an expensive but good fish restaurant.

The next day we visited the Alhambra, which was every bit as interesting as we were told it would be. In the evening we strolled into town for a cheaper supper. Melon & Ham + Paella was OK but the pud was birds eye custard..... so we had a follow up ice cream before climbing the stairs to the hotel.

On our final day we walked round the old Moorish district and had an inexpensive but great lunch in a small square. Followed by a twice round the route bus ride as we could not work out where it was going. In the evening we visited the chapel by the cathedral where some notable Spanish Kings & Queens are buried, then on to a monastery of secluded nuns, impressive chapel completely covered in paintings.





















































































































































































Rhonda, Arcos de la Fronteria and other White Villages

We drove to Rhonda via The Garganta de Chrro Gorge. The Gorge itself was a long way for not very much, as yje bridge shown in the photographs is not for safe public access. The hotel was blessed with a great view from the room balcony. Apart from that and the evening meal of prawns wrapped in bacon it was a town you could bypass.




























































































Cadiz





