## Seville




















































































































We were sitting having a small snack near our hotel, when a table with young men underneath it came round the corner.

As I had been in Seville 5 years earlier in Easter week, I knew the answer....they were learning how to carry and navigate an Easter float on their heads.
















## Caseres and Salamanca

Driving from Seville to Caceres we stopped off at Zafra for coffee (below), which seemed as quiet as it was five years ago when I walked on the Via de la Plata. At Caceres we stayed in this huge modern hotel, walked through the old town (Monday... it was closed) and ate out at an indifferent restaurant. Even the route marks for the Camino in the Plaza Major had been removed. On the way to Salamanca we diverted to the Jerte valley via mountain villages and drove up mountain passes at 1000m+.

At Salamanca we stayed at a good chain hotel by the Cathedral, in the centre. On the first night it was cold and windy, the first and only time on the holiday. We started of with a drink in Plaza Major beffore going on to a grim but expensive meal.

On the next day we had breakfast in a bar before setting off to visit the University buildings, the old and new Cathedrals (two for the price of one!) followed by a good and inexpensive lunch in a hostel bar. After a session of R&R in our hotel room we visited the Art Deco museum (the real reason to visit Salamanca!) a Dominican Monastery rounded off with a walk on the bridge and a drink in Plaza Major.


















































































## Madrid

The next morning we were up early to make sure we were at the front of the crowd for the Palacio Real, which sadly did not open until an hour later than advertised. Now in need of a coffee we stopped in a square on our way to a bar Rob had suggested for lunch, which was excellent. We both had Paella ... I forgot to take the photo, but managed one of the remains to remind us of a great lunch. We then went to Plaza de Espana, a very austere square of the Franco era. To continue our long walk we went to Museo Thyssen-Bornemisza, which would have been very good if they had cleaned the pictures, instead you saw dark dull famous masters.

Up again early the next day to visit Monasterio de las Descalzas, same story we had to wait an hour as you were only allowed round as a group and the English group was not until 11am. So we repaired to a chocolate shop, where regrettably we could not do full justice to the place having just had a big breakfast. Impressive Monasterio but no photography allowed.

We then found our way to the Plaza Major and were greeted with a procession of huge flags and dancing in traditional costumes, yet another fiesta, this time for Madrid's patron saint. It was J's birthday so we had lunch in the square. After a period of R&R at our howe made our way to the Prado art gallery; the best art gallery ever. We arrived three hours before it closed and we got to see most of the display, but little time to stop and enjoy. No photography again!

Walking back to the hotel we joined large crowds celebrating Athletico Madrid's winning the Spanish football league. We wandered into the Plaza Major where there was a concert on....we soon adjourned to the ice cream shop near the hotel for more calories to see us through to breakfast.










































































































































## Toledo

By this time we were 'touristed' out', so after a SB + coffee we found a courtyard in a museum to sit and wait until it was time to go to the station and a return trip to Madrid.








































































## Madrid Return
